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Creating Joy

Now 94 years young, Howard Dickson spends as much time as he can in the studio participating in the Ozerdinc Grimes Family Therapeutic Recreation and Creative Arts Program.

"I love working with clay the most," he says, "but I do 'em all—painting, woodworking, pottery, whatever's available. I wish I could spend even more time in the studio."

Howard's current project is a large birdbath for a courtyard garden at Perley Health. He hasn't felt this passionate about arts and crafts since he attended high school eight decades ago. Born in Perth, Ontario, Howard enlisted in the Canadian Armed Forces at age 19 and served overseas in Korea and Cyprus, mostly on peacekeeping missions. He was later posted to various bases across Canada, and married and raised four children. After retiring from the Canadian Armed Forces, he bought a farm in southern Manitoba, where he grew wheat and kept a small herd of cows. When his health began to decline, he returned to Ontario to live with his brother's family and moved into Perley Health six months before the pandemic.


"I found out about Perley Health online," he says. "It looked like the perfect place for me and I'm happy to be here—especially when I'm working on a project."

A self-described fixer-upper, Howard often finishes art projects started—and then abandoned—by other residents. His positive attitude and determination inspire residents and staff alike.

"I keep my eye on others and will offer my help if I think they need it," he says. "I'll help anybody that's trying to do good."

Howard keeps active at Perley Health in other ways; he serves on the Food Committee, for instance, and maintains a vegetable garden.





"Even if I don't feel 100%, I'll drag myself to the studio because it helps me feel better," he says simply.

The roots of the Program stretch back more than a century, when the United Kingdom began to provide handicraft training to Veterans of World War I. During the Second World War, the Canadian Red Cross provided similar training to Canadian soldiers recuperating in military hospitals and convalescent homes. After the war, the initiative continued in institutions across Canada, including at Perley Hospital, which was amalgamated into Perley Health in 1995. Virtually no research has been done about the therapeutic impacts, however. "Over the years, thousands of Veterans have benefitted from these activities," says Danielle Sinden, Director of the Perley Health Centre of Excellence in Frailty-Informed Care (CoE). "To understand how and why they benefit, we need to gather empirical data about impacts on health and well-being."

As part of this effort, two CoE studies currently underway at Perley Health focus on the Program. This essential research stands to strengthen the case for implementing similar initiatives in other homes. Transforming Care for all Veterans and Seniors

In 1995, three of these were amalgamated to create Perley Health. The expertise and knowledge amassed along the way have inspired Perley Health to pursue a larger goal: to transform care for all Veterans and Seniors—not only those who live at Perley Health. Throughout 2022, donors expressed overwhelming support for our new goal.

It is widely understood that Canada's healthcare and long-term care systems are in crisis. Due to an ageing population, the problem will likely worsen in the coming decades. Perley Health proposes an appropriate solution: develop, validate and implement new models of care. And Perley Health has all of the elements needed to accomplish this task: dedicated, experienced staff; a proven ability to continuously improve quality of care; supportive families, and government, healthcare and educational partners.

Thanks to the support of donors, more older adults and Veterans have an opportunity to live life to the fullest. Three years ago, donor support enabled Perley Health to take a giant step toward our larger goal by establishing of the Centre of Excellence in Frailty-Informed Care (CoE). The CoE conducts and shares the practical research needed to transform care for Seniors and Veterans—research about the efficacy of specific interventions and care practices, for instance, and about the best ways to train caregivers. Since its establishment, the CoE has rapidly matured into a thriving, respected hub of research and knowledge mobilization. Peer-reviewed journals increasingly feature CoE research—studies about a proven fallsprevention program and a collaborative approach to the development of care in long-term care homes. With many additional studies underway, the CoE continues to attract a growing number of research partners. As a result, relevant innovations and knowledge are widely shared, and used to train professional caregivers, educate students and shape public policy. Ultimately, quality of care improves for all Seniors and Veterans.

Our Answering the Call Campaign is raising the funds needed to transform care for Veterans and Seniors. To date, the Campaign has raised well over \$9.2 million—a clear indication that you believe in our larger vision! Thanks to your ongoing support, loyalty and trust, I'm confident we can fully realize the vision. Canada's older adults and their families are forever grateful.

More than a century ago, a group of progressive, compassionate Ottawans established the Perley Home for the Incurables—a residence dedicated to providing top-quality care. While Perley Health has evolved significantly since then, its commitments to delivering top-quality care and continuous improvement remain constant. 



Honouring their Values



Ruth and James (Jim) Gray's decision to leave significant gifts in their wills to the Perley Health Foundation honours their values. During their lifetimes—Jim passed in 2014 and Ruth in 2022 each also donated regularly to the Foundation.

"Jim served in the Royal Canadian Air Force during the Second World War," says niece Karen Martin, executor of her Aunt Ruth's estate. "And his time in uniform marked the rest of his life and profoundly influenced Ruth. Although neither one lived or received care at Perley Health, they both appreciated the exceptional care that Veterans receive there."

Ruth Gray (née Johnsen) emigrated from Denmark with her family before the Depression. Jim came of age in Cornwall, Ontario and enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force at age 18. The two met at a bowling alley after the war, soon became inseparable and eloped in 1962. They settled in Ottawa, where both enjoyed long careers in the public service: Ruth in municipal government and Jim with the federal government. The two enjoyed skiing, golf and tennis; Ruth was also a talented seamstress and painter. They spent summers at the cottage that Jim built in the Gatineau Hills and eventually spent their winters at their condo in Florida.

"They were a private couple and I didn't get to know them very well until my husband and I also bought a property in Florida," says Karen Martin. "They were always willing to help family, though."

Niece Lisa Gray thoroughly researched Jim's wartime service. Between 1942 and 1945, Jim completed a total of 43 missions for Bomber Command, including 31 missions aboard a Lancaster as a bomb aimer for attacks on Nazi Germany. Other missions included deliveries of food and humanitarian aid. Although eligible for transfer after completing 25 missions, Jim chose to continue.

"Like many Veterans, Jim rarely spoke about his years of service," says Lisa Gray. "As Jim approached his 25th mission, he chose to stay because they had survived as a group—which was exceptional—it was considered bad luck to break up the crew. Several of Jim's fellow crew members needed to complete more missions to reach that milestone, so he stayed on."

Of the approximately 125,000 airmen to serve in Bomber Command (including 50,000 Canadians), 55,573 died in action—a mortality rate of 44.4





percent, the highest of all the armed services. While Allied bombing raids damaged Nazi war infrastructure, they also killed many German civilians—500,000 by some estimates—creating a conflicted legacy for Bomber Command in the decades after the war. Only in 2011 did Commonwealth countries begin to honour the men who served in Bomber Command.

"In 2012, the Government of Canada finally created a special medal—the Bomber Command Bar—for those who served," says Lisa Gray. "By that time, however, only 17 Canadian Bomber Command Veterans were still alive. Uncle Jim was bitter that the recognition took so long and declined the invitation to attend a ceremony to receive his medal in person. I have no doubt that his wartime experience left him with psychological scars for the rest of his life."

After the war, Jim never got into an airplane again. He kept in touch with members of his crew, but declined invitations to attend reunions in Europe.

"Uncle Jim always seemed a bit restless," says Lisa Gray. "He always positioned himself in the room so that he could see the door."

"Uncle Jim and Aunt Ruth were patriotic Canadians who believed in service and commitment to God, King and Country," says Karen Martin. "Their giftin-will to Perley Health and to four other charities reflects this commitment. We will miss them forever."

Making a Difference Every Day



Thanks in large part to the support of donors, Perley Health continues to make a difference every day in the lives of Veterans and Seniors. During 2022, your donations contributed to many significant accomplishments, such as the creation of a secure unit in the Rideau Veterans Residence. All of our Veteran residents living with dementia are now together in one place, where they receive the specialized care they need and deserve. The renovations enhance the experiences of residents, their families and staff.

Ongoing donor support also contributes to a key goal for Perley Health: making a difference in the lives of Veterans and Seniors both within, and outside our walls. The most prominent proof of this is the Centre of Excellence in Frailty-Informed Care[™] (CoE), established in 2019. The CoE leads and partners in projects to develop, validate and disseminate evidence-based best practices and models of care. Two recent examples demonstrate the CoE's impact.

The article Lessons from Long-Term Care Home Partners during the COVID-19 Pandemic provides the long-term care (LTC) sector with practical guidance that individual homes can readily apply. To prepare the article, the CoE partnered with peopleCare Communities, an independent operator of LTC homes and retirement residences in Ontario. The article reported that appropriate preparation and strong leadership enabled some LTC homes to respond rapidly and effectively, and minimize negative outcomes. The article was published in Healthcare Quarterly, a journal that aims to document and disseminate leading practices and innovation in health service delivery.

A second important CoE study appeared in The Canadian Geriatrics Journal. The study is an evaluation of SeeMe®: Understanding frailty together, an innovative program developed and implemented at Perley Health. SeeMe® is a comprehensive approach to care that integrates the assessment and management of frailty with an emphasis on early and transparent communication with residents and families to establish a resident's goals of care. The evaluation of SeeMe® documents high rates of satisfaction among nurses, physicians and the families of long-term care residents, along with fewer residents and families choosing to transfer to hospital. Publishing the study in a leading peer-reviewed journal, combined with the CoE's ongoing knowledge-transfer efforts, make it easier for other homes to improve the quality of care they deliver.

The effectiveness of the CoE contributed to another stellar accomplishment:

Accreditation Canada has again awarded its top-level designation to Perley Health. The designation, known as Exemplary Standing, is the result of a comprehensive assessment against established standards of excellence in healthcare quality and safety. Accreditation Canada is the national, independent, non-profit body that reviews and assesses the operations of care facilities. Perley Health first earned the Exemplary Standing designation in 2018
